

Wednesdays are NO LONGER Hot Food Days

This is finished for the year now. The weather is warm enough that we don't need hot food. Wednesday's are normal days again.

The Monday Lunches has been a staple at Roto-o-Rangi School for many years now. It has been a good fundraiser to offset camp costs in the past. However, over the last few years the income from the Monday Lunches has been dwindling each year and is now taking up teachers' time for little reward. So, let's get behind the scheme for the last 2 times this year, and at the beginning of 2017 to ensure we continue having this unique start to our week.

SCHOOL POOL

The pool keys are out for hire again. The standard \$35 fee for 18 weeks of access to the school pool for the entire family is not a bad return. Keys can be collected and paid for at the front office.

With the current health and safety requirements there is a much greater expectation on the people using the pool to follow safety guidelines. As the BOT are ultimately responsible they do not want to be getting fines or law cases brought against them, so we implore everyone to use the pool safely.

Whilst most of the guidelines are common sense, the ones that get broken are those that are just inconvenient - like rule number 2 – "actively supervising". This is just the type of rule broken that can get the BOT fined. So please don't just ignore the rules.

- Nobody is to swim alone. There must always be at least one adult present inside the pool fencing when the pool is in use. Additional supervising adults are required as the number of people swimming increases.
- 2. Children under 8 must be actively supervised by someone who is at least 16, who can give immediate help. i.e. the supervising person needs to be in the water or at the edge.
- 3. The gate is always securely closed. Adults to monitor this occurs.
- 4. Nobody is to swim while under the influence of alcohol or drugs.
- 5. Check the depth of water before entering the pool.
- 6. Check for hazards, such as broken glass, sharp objects, slippery surfaces and clear or avoid these areas.
- 7. No running, jumping, or diving into the pool.
- 8. Kick boards, noodles, inflatable rings, etc. are acceptable types of pool equipment. Boogie boards, surf boards, etc. are not to be used in the pool.
- 9. A first aid kit is in the girl's changing room shelves.

CHRISTMAS PARADE

Unfortunately there will not be a Roto-o-Rangi float in Cambridge Christmas parade because we did not have enough support to prepare one. Thank you to people who offered. Next year we'll get one back in there again.

YEAR 5 LEADERSHIP DAY

The final Leadership Day for the Year 5s is next Tuesday. This is preparing them to take on those leadership roles that the school relies on students for, plus preparing them for some other challenging leaders roles and giving them the confidence to take them on.

BYOD AT SCHOOL

Room 5 are trialling Bring Your Own devices for use at school as from Monday. If this is successful until the end of the year then we will open it up to Room 4 and 5 next year. A meeting will be held next week on 7th Dec from 5-6pm at school to outline the reasons behind BYOD, preferences for devices and the guidelines behind these being used at school.
