



TEACHERS' UNION MEETING

Thank you to everyone for your support in allowing nearly all our teaching staff to get to the union meeting. This did allow the education sector to clearly show the government that the Funding Review needs it's own review.

This still remains a crucial topic that will effect all schools for decades to come so it needs to be right. I would like to keep you all informed so that you know too.

Schools are currently funded on the number of children in the school. Schools who have children from lower socio economic areas area given significantly more money than school from high socio economic areas which is known as decile funding. So decile 1 schools receive significant funding and it decreases the further up the decile rating you go. Roto-o-Rangi School is a decile 9. Decile 10 is the highest group receiving the least money in the Operations Grant money. Poverty does cause huge issues for learning and so these schools do need much more support to provide extra programmes to help the children achieve what they are capable of. We believe decile system is unbalanced currently and just basing funding on levels of poverty does not directly help those children in most need. It needs reviewing. Schools however are currently staffed on the number of children in their school and are guaranteed a minimum number of teachers. The amount of experience of the teachers has no effect – we could get 4 in-experienced teachers or like we have now, 4 very experienced teachers and it does not cost the school a cent. The amount of teachers and their level of experience does not effect the school budget currently but under the new system it will be. The school will responsible for the number of teachers and the level of experience of those teachers - which has to fit the funds they are provided. With that funding aimed at only the average wage of the teachers, not at the level for very experienced teachers which our school enjoys.
