SEATBELTS and SAFETY

A number of concerned parents have informed me about a major concern. They have seen children picked up from school in the afternoon and when the car has driven off the children are not in any form of restraint – no seatbelt, no car seat.

Regardless of how far from home we are, there is always the chance of an accident (not everyone on the road drives as safely as we do) so please make sure your children are all appropriately restrained before driving off. We also have a number of parents encouraging their children to jump the fence, cross the road or come to their car through the carpark unsupervised. This is the busiest and most potentially dangerous part of the day and we need parents to be taking the lead in keeping their own children safe. It is not that big an ask for parents to come

into the school grounds and escort their children safely to

and from their vehicle. Help us keep your children safe.

SWIMMING POOL OPENING

The pool is planned to be available on 19th November. Families may begin renting keys for the pool from this date. Swimming lessons will begin at school during this time depending on weather conditions.

When renting a key please do remember that there are rules and requirements about the use of the pool and the area. This is not a locally owned pool, it is a government facility on government grounds and so there are legal requirements therein. We all have to ensure we and others are abiding by these requirements, otherwise issues will arise that will have to be dealt with. Due to rising costs of chemicals, and the cost of paying Rod to look after the pool, the cost for the pool keys has had to rise. School families will be charged \$45 for the 20 weeks they can use the pool. Other local families will pay \$50.

CAMBRIDGE COMMUNITY OF LEARNERS

Nearly all the schools in Cambridge are part of a government initiative called Communities of Learning. The aim is to provide a more cohesive transition from Early childhood to Primary to Intermediate to High School for the children of Cambridge. All the schools in the COL (called Te Puna o Kemureti) are currently working on 3 key foci – Learner Agency, Culturally Responsive practice and Teaching as Inquiry. As you will be aware our main focus has been on Learner Agency. The COL is led by 1 principal and I wish to acknowledge the work of the Learnington principal who has established the COL and has recently stepped down from the role. We wish the new lead principal, from Goodwood, all the best with this huge task.

BUS CHANGES

Once again we have had a few children telling us that their bus arrangement has changed, but the parents have not contacted school to let us know. We CANNOT make this change without notification from the parents first. It could put your child in danger, if they have made a mistake (and regularly we have children misunderstand parents thinking and try to change their bus arrangement when they shouldn't) and end up at the bus stop alone. Also, if there is a particular pattern to your bus arrangement (i.e. they get picked up every Thursday because they are staying at school for Netball) could you please notify Lorraine when that arrangement changes. Thanks.

CHRISTMAS PARADE

We will be entering the Cambridge Christmas Parade again this year, but we need people to volunteer to help with decorating the float.

Golden Stars is the proposed theme for the year, so any gold items, especially gold stars, that can be used on the float would be marvellous.

We will decorate the float on the morning of Sunday 2nd December. Children are welcome to be on the float and we will be asking for children to join the float at a later date.

BEFORE AND AFTER SCHOOL CARE

Just a little reminder that BSC and ASC operate from 7.30am – 8.30am and then from 3.15pm – 5.30pm. Children who are at school prior to 8.30am, or after 3.15pm will be required to go to BSC or ASC and consequent costs applied. (The only exception to this is the children who arrive at school by bus before 8.30am – they will be supervised by staff in classrooms until 8.30am) Parents do not need to have set days or times their child might attend ASC or BSC, just a call to let us know and making sure you have completed an enrolment form with all the contact and medical details. The supervisors need all the information on the form in case of an emergency.

WHANAU MEETING

We are proposing to hold a Whanau meeting at school on Thursday 29th November at 6pm. A pizza tea will be provided for those attending (tamariki included) so you can bring the whanau and not have to cook for 1 night. A staff member will be here to supervise the tamariki whilst the adults are in the hui.

The plan for part of the meeting is student achievement in 2018 and what whanau would like to see included in the school charter goals for 2019 and vision of the school. If there is anything else to add to the agenda we can do so on the night.

The children in Room 4 are keen to show the bi-cultural nature of our school through painting some kowhaiwhai patterns on pou around the school. Anyone who could help with this or have any suggestions can also discuss this on the night.

RURAL SCHOOLS' ATHLETICS DAY

READING AT HOME

On the 27th November at 5.00pm we will have an afternoon demonstartion of how parents can support their children with reading at home. It is not about teaching your child to read, rather similar techniques to what the teachers use in class. By reinforcing the same techniques at home and school, we should get even better readers coming out of Roto-o-Rangi School.

We will use a couple of children to demonstrate the type of techniques which help children develop good reading strategies. These are not complicated so there is nothing to be worried about. We will explain the reasons behind the startegies used and why we use these ones.

It is expected that the afternoon will take around ½ - ¾ hr. These techniques are more aimed at our younger students learning to read and older students who have some reading difficulties.
