DIGITAL COMMUNICATION

The Facebook page with the most relevant / time sensitive information about school events and happenings is up and running – The Roto Parents facebook page.

This closed group – so only people we allow to see the page can – is getting out that information about the day to day notices and info, so the whole world can't see it.

We are also trialling a free app you can get on you phone. This is called **Skool Loop** and can be downloaded from your Store (Apple and Android). WHOLE SCHOOL CAMP CHANGE OF DATE!

Due to a clash with Teacher Union Meetings being held when we were going to be on camp we have moved our camp to a week later – Thursday 5th April (Thursday after Easter) will be our Whole School Camp. Year 4-6 will still be walking over the top of Mt Maungatautari, from one side to the other. Year 1-3 will be doing some eco studies around the Roto-o-Rangi area or going to the Southern enclosure. Thursday night will be spent here at school with Year 3-6 in tents and Year 1-2 in the MP Room or Room 2. If families have tents we will need them please. The Outdoor Ed trailer we used to access is no longer. So we are relying on loads of family tents being available for the fun of sleeping at school.

School will be as normal as possible on the Friday, and children will venture home at 3pm.

A form about providing transport to the walks and support on the walks plus supplying tents will be coming home shortly.

So make sure you keep the day and night free. As required by the MOE and policy of the BOT, all camps are alcohol free. Your child's safety is our paramount objective.

BOT NEWS

The first meeting has been and the School Charter has been developed for 2018. This is viewable on the school website. It sets the direction and focus of the school for this year and the next 3 years.

The budget is tight due to supporting the staffing, but all that would be rectified if the numbers grow, so we need everyone out there talking about the benefits of coming to Roto-o-Rangi School. If there is anything stopping people making a move to us get them to ring the principal to see if a solution can be found so we can remove any barrier from them coming.

Meanwhile, we continue to focus on providing great learning for the children already here.

Those strong foundation skills, the social growth, the leadership opportunities, the relationships with their teacher/each other and yet they don't miss out on opportunities bigger schools provide. Children are able to do things like computer coding and visual imaging, have access to IT whilst still having strong spelling and handwriting programmes.

There have been a couple of meetings regarding the Country Bus and unfortunately the BOT have had to make the decision to remove the extra extensions that the school pays the bus company to do. The budget can no longer support this additional cost. There is some impact for some families catching that bus but not to significant we hope.

The ERO report is finalised and should be public in the next week. As soon as it is, there will be link on the website to celebrate the great things happening. Here are a few quotes from it:
