It is also the employer of all staff, including the principal, and sets the overall strategic direction for the school or kura. The principal is the board's 'chief executive' and manages the school or kura in line with the board's direction and policies.

Every board member brings their own unique set of skills and experiences to the board.

As a member of your school's board, you will need to work well in a team and have good communication skills. You may have financial skills and experience in managing people, knowledge and understanding of particular communities within your school, or experience working within your school and wider communities. School boards need to represent the diversity of their school communities to ensure a bright future for all our children. So, your background, whatever that is, could be the very thing this BOT is missing.

YUMMY APPLE STICKERS



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
